Fruta del Norte (FDN) is considered a "Strategic Project" by the government of Ecuador.

- Approximate Reserves: 5.02 million ounces of gold.
- Average annual production: 310,000 ounces
- Life of mine: Approximately 15 years.
- Lundin Gold arrived in Ecuador in 2015 to take FDN forward.
- Currently in Construction Phase.
- LUG's Fundamental Principles: Working safely, environmental stewardship and Respect.

Social Context Surrounding Fruta del Norte

- Zamora-Chinchipe is among the least developed provinces of Ecuador.
- Little existing industry prominent economic activities are coffee, plantains, cocoa, dairy and artisanal mining.
- No communities or people live within the area of direct influence.
 - Area indirect influence is primarily composed of the parish of Los Encuentros (LE) - population of approximately 4,000.
 - Town of LE has a population of approximately 1,200 and is the nearest large community to Fruta del Norte (42 km via current road).
- Other mining companies in Zamora Chinchipe and other provinces are facing several challenges to develop their projects.








Arrival of Lundin Gold to Ecuador: Context

- Strong level of uncertainty given the departure of Kinross.
- Local economic recession.
- Local stakeholders were skeptical regarding mining based on the history that Ecuador has with oil industry.
- Presence of activist groups against mining at the national level.
- Local and national concern regarding mining practices (traditional artisanal / illegal mining history).
- Significant expectations around employment, community investment, and economic opportunities.







A Change in Dialogue Approach is Required



- Develop a shared vision regarding the risks, challenges and opportunities that FDN Project entails.
- Generate a participative process, in which dialogue and jointly-undertaken actions that contribute to tangible positive change.

Main Phases of the Process

- Started in July 2016 after this process of issue identification that included communities, authorities, public and private institutions, etc.
- The roundtables are an open space of free opinion and collective action that is facilitated and monitored by a neutral and specialized third party, INSUCO










Characteristics of the Dialogue Process



- Proactively developed through a process of risk identification with the local communities. The process did not respond to a crisis.
- Strong alignment with local government planning.
- Aligned with the Company's community investment strategy and policies.
- Ongoing, without a fixed end date.
- Strong engagement by Lundin Gold leadership.
- Dialogue is oriented towards collective action and project implementation.
- Strong Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) process.
- Involvement of the Ford Foundation to extract lessons from the process and replicate them in other extractive territories.



Positive Indicators



Local communities, local companies, contractors, NGOs, civil society (local, national and international), academia, state institutions (local and national), among others.

- 38 months (July 2016 September 2019).
- Sessions approximately every six weeks (22 to date)
- Attendance of 3,899 from more than 1,684 individuals.
- Business Opportunities and Agricultural Development are the roundtables with highest levels of interest.
 - Survey of participants undertaken in 2019.
 - 98%: respectful dialogue space.
 - 97%: promotes coordination among different stakeholders.
 - 94%: promotes planning for local development
- 73%: mechanism that contributes to solve local issues.

Environmental Responsibility Roundtable

- Lundin Gold is committed to following IFC Performance Standards.
- Ongoing sharing of information regarding important aspects of the company's environmental management such as:
 - Biotic rescue, nursery management, water management and erosion control
 - Archeological monitoring
 - Status of the permits
 - Audits by the Ministry of Environment, among others.
- Strong presence of the academia:
 - Experimental Station of the Universidad Nacional de Loja
 - Biology Faculty of the Universidad Estatal Amazónica.
- An important component for a three-year collaboration initiative with Conservation International Ecuador.
 - Develop and implement a biodiversity conservation and offset plan and support sustainable ecosystems services in FDN's area of influence.





Environmental Responsibility Roundtable

- In response to a request from this roundtable, Lundin Gold worked to develop a systematic community-based monitoring program.
- Our goal is to train and empower community members to better understand and trust environmental monitoring data.
- In 2017, we engaged with the 17 communities within the Project's area of indirect influence to explore the concept of the community monitoring.
- 24 participants attended a tailored course (designing, sampling, analyzing and interpreting water quality data) and completed a final exam.
- In 2018, an agreement was signed with the Universidad Católica de Cuenca to further develop the community water monitoring program through the







Environmental Responsibility Roundtable

Key Considerations

- The main priorities in Los Encuentros and Yantzaza are business opportunities and employment.
- Although recognized as an important topic in a general sense, this roundtable presents low levels of interest and participation.
- The presence of academia has improved the dynamic of this space. Universities can help to raise the profile of this topic.
- The engagement of senior Lundin Gold staff and interactions with the participants of the roundtable has been important.
- The transparency and openness of the process is key for the generation of trust bases among stakeholders.
- Capacity building is important due to the lack of technical knowledge.





Lessons Learned from the Dialogue Process

- Importance of jointly identifying social risks through a participatory process to build trust.
- Inclusive processes that promote the sharing of responsibilities among participants.
- Early and ongoing engagement of Lundin Gold's leadership.
- Transparency is fundamental.
- Sharing of accountability and financial contributions is key to long-term sustainability of the process. This must start from the beginning.
- These types of dialogue processes can be replicated in other projects.
- These processes are long-term in nature, but ultimately more productive than transactional approaches.





Challenges Associated with the Dialogue Process

- Develop a long-term regional development planning agenda.
- Empower youth at the local level.
- Sustainability of the process.
- Strengthening the multi-stakeholder approach around social investment.
- Lack of Independent funding for the roundtables
- Ecuador's political and economic context.
- Political changes.
